#### 2 First Encounter 375 commemoration--Documentaries

### 3 Oranjehof & Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom (Foxton)

As part of the April 2018 Netherlands King's Day celebration, several important things happened at the Oranjehof Dutch Connection at Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom at Foxton. The Oranjehof tribute to the Dutch in Aotearoa from 1642 on was opened last December, and has since been named winner of Museums Aotearoa's annual "Museum Project Award":



#### 5 Ron Aaron remembered

Ron Aaaron, who died in Nelson in May aged 96, was a UK-trained master model-maker. He created the wonderful models of Tasman's *Heemskerck* (right) and the scow *Pearl Kasper* which are on display in the Golden Bay Museum at Takaka. His final visit to the museum was in February 2016 (right).

## 6 Abel Tasman Medal of Honour ('Erepenning') presented



For the second time since 2000 when it was initiated, the Municipality of Grootegast has awarded its Abel Tasman Medal of Honour ('Erepenning') to a New Zealander: Penny Griffith, Convenor of the First Encounter 375 Planning Group. The first New Zealand recipient (in 2000) was Nelson resident and proud Dutchman Addo Mulders, who has also collaborated with Penny on commemoration efforts.

Ambassador Rob Zaagman (left) presented the silver medal at the 19 May screening of the First Encounter 375 documentary in Takaka, explaining that it acknowledged Penny's work

organising events over several years to promote awareness of Tasman's voyage and its significance for Maori.

Also part of the presentation was a magnificent 2017 publication on the history of the Dutch East India Company (VOC), reflecting archival treasures held in the Netherlands State Archives (Nationaal Archief). ### 7 Tuia Encounters 250 (2019)

The commemoration of the 250th anniversary of James Cook's First Voyage has been designated a "national event" which will be marked in New Zealand between October and December 2019. Central government has allocated a total of \$14 million funding: \$9 million of Lottery funds for community events plus a \$5 million initial grant to cover administration and visits by the *Endeavour* replica and waka hourua (Polynesian voyaging canoes).
